Art from a New Perspective

Pre-Project: Discovering My Aesthetic Taste

- 1. From a vast array of art works, select the one which attracts you the most. Make this decision largely based on aesthetic principles over the work's content. Look carefully for the lines, colors textures, shapes, arrangements, energy, mood etc. that most engage you. In your sketchbook, in the sketches section, record the work's details from the back of the postcard. Include the name of the artist, date, title, materials, and the size or scale of the work.
- 2. Make a copy of this work (in whole or large detail) in your sketchbook. While making this copy, think about, and pay attention to, the elements or moments in the work that excite you the most. Ask yourself things like, "Why am I attracted to this work?" "Why do I feel intrigued by this art?" "What do I find exciting about this work?" "Which element of art is most engaging for me here?" "What does this work remind me of?"
- 3. After making the copy, make a written description of the work's elements. (What kinds of colours, lines, shapes, values, space or texture are in this work?)
- 4. Describe its arrangement or composition by analyzing its balance, emphasis, variety, repetition or contrast. Also, give the details of the work's content. (For example, a portrait of a woman sitting on a purple couch.)
- 5. Write about or reflect upon your experiences with the artwork, aiming to identify the aesthetic qualities you were most attracted to. Answer the questions in part two of this exercise to discover what your aesthetic tastes are.

Perspective Water Colour

- 1. First, you will work on perspective lessons in class to gain control of the picture plane and control proportions.
- 2. Then, complete the work in the exercise "DISCOVERING MY AESTHETIC TASTE" and decide what it is that most intrigues you about the art work you selected.
- 3. Learn water colour techniques as well as 1pt & 2pt perspective techniques at the "in class workshops".
- 4. Create a list of at least FIVE environments you would like to create that include the aspect of the art work you were most attracted to.
- 5. Draw at least FIVE thumbnail sketches of these possible environments.
- 6. Draw a full page working sketch of the thumbnail that is most successful, considering the placement of the vanishing points, composition, and colour scheme.
- 7. Using the water colour techniques learned in class, create your final art work on prepared water colour paper.
